The tragic and sad demise of five Sri Lankan expatriate workers, amongst many other nationalities, in a fatal bustruck accident on the Dammam highway from Riyadh in June is a stark reminder to everyone on how severe the impact of neglecting safety can be in every aspect of our daily lives.

Driving safely, especially in inclement weather, should be foremost in the minds of anyone who takes the wheel and sets out on the many highways across the desert sands. The large number of tragic road accidents reported annually within the Kingdom is also a cause for much concern.

Consideration for others on the road should be the baseline for safe driving. Lack of safety, within the Kingdom, is also manifest in many other areas in our homes, places of work, schools, malls, and other areas. It is quite common to see electrical cables and plumbing laid out unsafely in many residential and business locations. Contractors and builders do not seem to consider safety as a critical need when designing and constructing.

Another area of great risk is the total neglect of safety in and around schools during the peak hours in the mornings and afternoons. Dropping and picking kids, both, by parents and drivers at the entrance of schools in most locations shows a very lackadaisical attitude towards safety by many drivers.

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Sri Lankan Ambassador Passes Away



Sri Lankan Ambassador in the Kingdom, Abdul Ageed Mohamed Marleen, 71, passed away in Yemen while attending a conference in Sana'a Tuesday June 23, . 2009.

The envoy was attending the meeting of the Indian Ocean Rim - Association for Regional Cooperation at the Movenpick Hotel in Sana'a.

According to Manisha Gunasekera, who was attending the conference on behalf of the Sri Lanka Foreign Ministry, Marleen had not turned up for the meeting on Tuesday morning. "His prolonged absence for the day persuaded the concerned authorities to open his room with the help of the Sana'a police and found him dead on his bed."

Deputy Minister Hussein Bhaila who arrived in Sanaa this morning told Arab News that he officially identified the body at the morgue and arrangements were made by the foreign ministry to dispatch the remains to Colombo in deference to the wishes of the family members. According to Bhaila, the judicial medical officers in Sanaa have confirmed that Marleen had died in his sleep due to natural causes.

Sabarullah Khan, Deputy Chief of Mission in Riyadh, flew to Sanaa immediately to look after the interests of the deceased. Marleen's wif,e Fatima also left for Colombo on SriLankan Airlines to attend her husband's funeral. Marleen is survived by his wife, three daughters - Sheroon in Brisbane, Shezoon and Shemoon in London and son, Shahran in Sanfrancisco.

The remains of Marleen arrived in Colombo on Thursday evening by a flight via Dubai and the funeral took place on Friday morning.

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AYURVEDA 2009

Fatal Road Accident Kills Five Lankans

Five Sri Lankans died in a major road accident on Thursday, which killed all 20 passengers on board including the Saudi driver and his assistant.

The accident took place about 30 km east of Riyadh when a Hofuf-bound SAPTCO bus collided with a truck entering from a shoulder lane during a blinding sandstorm. The victims were burned to death as the bus caught fire after crashing into the truck.

The crash was caused due to a heavy sandstorm that had reduced the visibility considerably. The incident took place at 8.30 p.m., an hour after the bus, carrying 20 passengers, (including the driver and his assistant) departed from the main bus terminal in Aziziyah.

The dead included the following Sri Lankans: Meera Lebbe Tavar of Nintavur, Subair Mafeez of Akkaraipattu, Abdul Gafoor of Sammanthurai. Mohamed Anis Mohamed Amza of Addalachenia, and Mendis Appuhamy-from Kandy

The first four of the five Sri Lankans who died in the accident were newly arrived construction workers. "They came to Rivadh and were proceeding to their workplace in Hofuf, some 300kms from Riyadh," Khan said. He said the mission has contacted their next of kin through the Foreign Ministry in Colombo to seek permission to bury them in the Kingdom.

Marleen went to Sanaa on Sunday June 21 and I met him on Saturday with a Saudi businessman who wanted to visit Sri Lanka with his family on a holiday. I was really amazed at the manner he treated the Saudi gentleman showing our traditional Sri Lankan hospitality. He saw that the entry visa was issued in 10 minutes while we were having discussions. He offered us tea and he presented the visitor with gift packets of tea and requested him to come again to the mission after completing his requirements.

Marleen possessed sterling qualities of an Ambassador, he was kind, gentle, sincere devoted to his profession and understood the qualities of the common man. Although his death had caused a great vacuum in the annals of the Sri Lanka living in the Kingdom, Ambassador Marleen will be remembered for ever for the yeoman services he rendered to the community here. I salute him for the sentiments he had towards the community and efforts he made to project Sri Lanka as a country full of potentials. Thank You Sir for all what u did to us and we will always remembers you in our prayers.

Sri Lankan Embassy in Riyadh has opened a condolence book for wellwishers and friends to sign. Marleen, was an eminent Colombobased lawyer, who has been in active practice for over 40 long years. He was bestowed with the post of President's Counsel in 2001. Since 1991 he has been the president of the Moors Islamic Cultural Home (MICH) and Secretary General of the Cairo-based Afro-Asian Solidarity Association. He has also officiated as the chairman of Board of Management of Zahira College in Colombo, which is the premier Islamic educational institution in the country's capital.
